Non-Federal Partners Meeting Opportunities

- Close the access gap and improve the welcome and experience of visitors from underrepresented groups
- Improve coordination among Federal recreation programs, while recognizing differences in agency recreation authorities
- Fund partnerships consistently to help sustain projects & collaboration
- Establish more youth workforce opportunities on Federal lands and waters
- Future Engagement
 - Hold regular opportunities for non-Federal partner-convened engagement
 - Establish a presence at existing regional and national conferences and other gatherings

- Develop an actionable nonfederal partners engagement strategy
- Maximize information sharing through the FICOR website and FICOR Working Group members as points of contact
