


#### **Our Vision**



#### Indigenous Worldview

With respect and reverence for our ancestors, we hold sacred the places where we live and the kincentric ecological systems on which we depend for our identities, lifeways, nourishment, and well-being. We accept the responsibility of being good stewards in reciprocal relationships with all beings and work together to facilitate healing, connectivity, and redistribution of knowledge, time, and resources within our communities. We are guided by the seven sacred teachings – love, respect, courage, honesty, wisdom, humility, and truth – in collaboration towards the restoration of cultural values, beliefs, practices, and relationships that were disrupted by historical and ongoing acts of colonization.


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
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Map of the population density and territories of indigenous peoples of North America at the beginning of the 21st century

- Indigenous people and lifeways persist



#### Our Approach: Bridging & Braiding


- Redefining what conservation is through an Indigenous kincentric perspective

- Continue to survive and thrive in spite of the ongoing legacy of colonialism




